

DUNGOG SHIRE COUNCIL NOTICE OF EXHIBITION DRAFT RURAL LANDS STRATEGY

Council has engaged consultants GHD to undertake a Rural Lands Strategy, which has four key focus areas:

- rural lands,
- environmental lands,
- economic development and
- balancing the growth of urban development (i.e. rural residential lands).

The draft document has been adopted by Council for exhibition and placed on Council's website inviting comment from the public. COVID 19 permitting, meetings and workshops will be held.

The Draft Rural Lands Strategy aims to protect and enhance agricultural lands throughout the Shire to support the existing agribusiness sector whilst providing opportunity for innovation and diversification across local agricultural and rural industries generally. The strategy considers opportunities for economic development through tourism and complimentary industries to agriculture and the natural environment.

The strategy also contains measures to protect and enhance areas with high biodiversity values throughout the Shire to ensure there are no adverse impacts from development on environmental values.

The review of the rural residential lands aims to balance growth to avoid adverse impacts on the natural environment and support agriculture by minimising land use conflict.

The key outcomes of the rural lands strategy once finalised in early 2022 will be recommendations for amendments to the Dungog Local Environmental Plan 2014 and Councils development control plans, policies and local strategies.



From the Parson's Pen

The last time I put 'pen' to paper for the Parson's Pen was December 2020. At that time, the worst of the 2020 Covid restrictions had begun to subside and as I wrote at the time, there was an air of energy and hope felt in the community; a relief that finally we were 'on the mend' so to speak or that the worst was well and truly, behind us. Sadly that relief was not to last, either for Sydney and more recently ourselves. Once again we find ourselves in lockdown due to the rapid spread this time, of the Delta version of Covid 19. Much that could be said about the 'whys' and 'if onlys' has already been said (and often in terms not fit to print!) so this particular 'Parson' desires to write about something that might give a helpful perspective on recent events. Back in July, I began preparing a preaching series for church on the book of Job. I had studied Job in Hebrew for a while at Theological College in Sydney. Studying a book of the Bible and preparing a preaching series on a book in the Bible are two very different 'animals', and Job is without doubt a most difficult book to preach on. The reason is, it is so raw and honest and clear about the human condition. Of course one aspect most prominent in Job is the issue of suffering. Anyone with even a minimal amount of life experience would agree – people suffer. But it is the kind of suffering, and the cause of the suffering that most find so confronting in the book of Job. The kind of suffering Job experienced was extreme. A once wealthy and wise man has all his property and farmland destroyed; becomes financially bankrupt; his children are killed and lastly he is inflicted with painful sores that keep him agony both day and night. He is in a state of intense emotional, spiritual and physical dereliction. And very much alone. So that's the kind of suffering, but about the cause? The most difficult aspect of Job to grapple with is coming to terms with the cause. The cause of his affliction – is God. The heavenly council chamber (hidden entirely from Job, but we have a bird's eye view through Scripture) is where the trigger is pulled. God gives Satan permission to afflict Job. A man who we are told numerous times (and is confirmed by God himself) is blameless (not sinless) but a man in a right relationship with God. The permission is not given as punishment for unresolved sin. God allows Satan to strike Job's life within defined limits. It was Satan's hope to prove that Job only loved God because of all he had been blessed with; that Job was, deep down just as corrupt as everyone else. God didn't have to give the permission. But he did. The story of Job dispenses with the fraud that bad things only happen to bad people, or that only good things always happen to good people. Even the most cursory glance at the world will prove that is simply not the case. It was the fraud that Job's friends had bought into and was very prevalent at the time – even most likely by Job himself just prior to his affliction. Many people at this point are probably asking a very important question right now. Why? Why would God give the terrible permissions he does to allow a 'good' man to suffer so, when so many evil people seem to prosper? This what makes preaching Job such a difficult series. Many people today are tempted to think that if someone is good (by whatever standard one happens to use to define 'good'), God will (or should) bring health, wealth and blessing after blessing to that person. And when that doesn't happen – others can behave just like Job's friends. Accusing him of unresolved sin and somehow deserving his fate in a case of bad divine 'Karma'. We may be asking why God does not end the pandemic in the world. If he is not able to, he is not all powerful, or if he is able to but chooses not to - is he not being immoral? These are questions about God that have occupied the minds of humans for centuries. The same questions are naturally asked by the reader of Job. In Job's case, his faith never faltered even though he complained bitterly to God over his situation (he did not sin by doing this).

When God finally speaks, he gives an unexpected response to Job's faith – giving him an incredibly powerful and poetic image of divine power and wisdom. It is at that point that Job realises that God is in control and in humility acknowledges God as both great and wise. It is in God's response that we see what the book of Job is really about. It is about God himself, and our humility to admit that we are not the all knowing and self sufficient creatures society likes to think we are. There is so much about God's world that we do not understand. Job is about undeserved suffering and therefore Job foreshadows Jesus - the blameless one who suffered infinitely more and actually fulfils Job. And if Job is about Jesus, it is also about every follower of Jesus. Each Christian must walk in the footsteps of Christ and expect to walk some way, the footsteps of Job. We would do well, to acknowledge the wisdom found in Job and pray to be given the grace to bow down in trust to him – the God who is, who he is. The dark lonely times of a pandemic or whatever other seemingly random calamity that occurs in life, is when we are called to love and trust most - walking in the footsteps of our Lord Jesus who suffered and gave himself for



Focus on Health & Fitness

When should you strap an injury?

Firstly, if you have an injury, you should be assessed by a health care professional to ensure there is nothing serious going on. Having said that, there are a number of reasons why taping is used.

Its's mostly used for soft tissue injuries such as strains & sprains and to restrict the amount of movement in a joint (ROM). This is done to limit the how far the affected joint can move so that further injury is prevented. It can also take the load off of muscles or ligaments, tendons, etc, so that the person can continue to function while allowing to injury to heal. Taping can also be used to manage swelling around an injury, particularly in the early, acute stages. On a more complicate



heal. Taping can also be used to manage swelling around an injury, particularly in the early, acute stages. On a more complicated issue, tape can be used to provide feedback to an athlete to manage problems or to improve performance. Taping is usually a temporary intervention designed to give an injury a chance to heal, occasionally it can be used to delay more significant intervention, such as surgery.

There are a few different tapes used for different purposes, the most common being Rigid Sports Tape. Often there will be an under tape as a first layer. This type of tape has no elasticity to it and is mostly used to restrict movement and support the joint. Often with minor injuries there is damage to the tendons (attaching muscle to bone) and ligaments (attaching bone to bone) and sometimes to cartilage (surface on the end of a bone where it meets another bone)or the meniscus (cushioning pad between the bones, such as in the knee).

Ok, so you've established that the injury is not serious and does not require a professional to look at it. (& please don't take the advice of that guy on Facebook!). You've bought some sports strapping tape. How do you actually do it?

Firstly, DON'T put it on too tightly! If there any signs of restriction in blood flow such as loss of colour in the extremities (fingers, toes) or numbness or pins & needles, then it's probably too tight. Take it off & try again.

Next. There is generally a layer of tape around the limb above and below the joint. This is known as the anchor layer and gives the other tape, which will cross the joint, something to attach to and better support the joint. The tape then usually crosses the joint in a few different directions, sometimes tape will run parallel with the joint as well. Knees, elbows, fingers & toes are usually not too complicated, given that they are hinge joints & only move in one plane or direction. Wrists are a little more complicated because of the extra ways they can move, and shoulders are probably the most complicated because of the ROM and the numerous muscle that can be involved.

If you're taping an area that has body hair, do yourself a favour and shave it first. Tape will DEFINITELY rip it all out when you remove it & will occasionally take a bit of skin as well.

There is a huge amount of information on the web regarding how to strap various injuries & joints. Please be sure to only follow the advice of legitimate, established sources. Not the guy who has discovered a better way that all the experts around the world have missed for the last 50 years. A simple one is elastoplast.com.au (no, they don't sponsor me). If you're in any doubt at all, consult your health professional.

GRASS FIRES

Grass fires can start quickly and spread rapidly, catching people off-guard. Grass fires are very hot and can produce huge amounts of heat that can kill anyone caught out in the open. The safest place to be during a grass fire is well away from the fire. When in the vicinity of a grass fire, always keep the burnt ground in mind as a safe refuge. If you are threatened by a grass fire, always protect yourself by covering up all exposed skin with protective clothing such as: Long-sleeved shirt and pants made from a natural fibre such as cotton. Sturdy leather boots and woollen socks. Leather gloves. A wide-brimmed hat. A face mask or towel to cover your mouth and nose. Eye protection such as goggles. Make sure you drink plenty of water to keep hydrated and be aware of your level of physical fitness, heat exhaustion, heat stroke and sunburn.

PROTECT YOUR POPERTY, LIVE STOCK AND CROPS

The Importance of Fire Breaks:

The spring time preparation of fire breaks by mowing, grazing, brush cutting or ploughing around buildings, crops, pasture, storage areas, along key fence lines and other exposures will greatly assist in fighting fires during the summer. Construct effective fire breaks as a means of preventing fire escapes from your property and reducing the likelihood of fires entering. Fire breaks should, where practical, be designed to avoid trees or to provide an additional break around the trees themselves. Work together with neighbours to construct effective fire breaks.

Please be aware of the fires in the area and if you are leaving...LEAVE EARLY!

Only the very well prepared and the very fit should stay. Houses are not built to withstand a catastrophic fire. For a fire plan or fire information go to

Council Report

Towards a New Local Environment Plan

Local Environment Plans (LEPs) determine how and where development takes place, and the current Dungog Shire 2014 LEP is under review, which is a long process following strict NSW Government guidelines. It began last year with a Rural Issues Paper leading to the Policy Directions Paper that guided the development of the Draft Rural Strategy, which has been adopted by Council and will undergo extensive community consultation for the next six weeks. It is used to establish key elements of the new LEP.

While the above paragraph may seem like "mumbo jumbo", the Draft Rural Strategy is a very important document that predicts how our community will develop into the future and proposes significant changes that may directly affect your property and our community in general, so be warned that you should get involved and participate.

The document has been placed on Council's website and COVID 19 permitting, meetings and workshops will be held seeking comment from the public. https://www.dungog.nsw.gov.au/rural-land-strategy

Regional Road Transfer (and Road Reclassification) Program

The NSW 2021-22 Budget committed \$250 million over three years to support the upgrades of roads transferred back to the government as part of the Regional Road Transfer program, which will see up to 15,000km of council-owned roads transferred back to the State.

The proposals affecting Clarence Town are for MR301 - Clarence Town Road, between Dungog and Raymond Terrace to become a State road and for Limeburners Creek Road - LR233 to become a Regional Road, until 1995 it used to be a Main Road and grant funding for the new Clarence Town Bridge acknowledged its strategic importance.

The Report has not yet been released but we expect these roads to be reclassified accordingly.

NSW Government "Fixing Country Roads" Program.

Council nominated eight priority roads for rehabilitation totaling \$9 million with Council contributing \$2.6 million. Sadly, we missed out but we have tried again in the current round of funding with the following five projects in our area: About 6KM of Glen Martin Road (\$2.34 million), about 3KM of Pinebrush Road (\$1.15 Million), the section of Queen Street Clarence Town between Rifle and Grey Streets (\$.75 million) and two sections of Duke Street (\$.86 Million). These roads are in very poor condition and it is beyond Council's financial capacity to fix them in a timely manner.

New Amenities Building Open

The upgrades to the sporting fields in Clarence Town are nearing completion after many months of consultation between Council staff and local sporting groups to ensure the new facilities met their needs. The Cobras Ruby League Club recently used the new building for the first time but the COVID 19 lockdown prevented the Kookaburras FC from a similar opportunity before arrangements are finalized.

This magnificent building is a community facility that will be available for hire. More work needs to be done and Council has submitted another grant application to relocate the cricket practice nets with the Clarence Town & District Progress Association offering to meet half the cost.




