

#### <u>Around The District</u>

Most of the solar lights have been dismantled and stored for next Christmas; those remaining create



a peaceful atmosphere should you walk or drive past at night.

The committee has been continuing to work on an event for the July Progress Association events and are part of that sub-committee. Speaking of which, as part of searching through Trove about Clarence Town, I notice the Progress Association has been in existence for at least 100 years. And been instrumental in lobbying different levels of government for water, roads, phone services, bridges, electricity and just about everything that we take for granted.

None of these have occurred without constant work over years by townsfolk to achieve successful outcomes. For instance, communications between the Clarence Town Progress Association and the Water and Sewerage Board over the supply of water to houses in town continued for years, beginning at least in 1922. The Board estimated the costs over 7000 pounds for revenue of 220 pounds per year in 1924. Council- then Wallarobba Shire Council- would have to commit 220 pounds per year but, even so, the Board made no provision in their budget to do the work. In 1935 it was still "impracticable"! But it happened.

#### Council Report Property Valuations and Rates.



Ratepayers will have received a notice from the NSW Valuer-General's Office updating property valuations, which only consider the value of the land itself and not houses or other structures etc.

In 2019 the total valuation of all rateable properties in Dungog Shire was \$1,584,379,513 and in 2022 it was assessed as \$3,734,350,593. Representing an increase of \$2,149,971,080 or 136%. This has absolutely no impact upon the <u>total revenue</u> that Council can collect from rates. But it can affect your rates because in some locations valuations will have increased more than others.

For FY 2022-23, Council will increase its rates Income above that collected last year by the IPART approved component of the Special Rate Variation of 10% (inclusive of the 4.4 % rate pegging allowance). So how do property valuations affect Council rates?

Rates are calculated using a combination of a Base Rate and an Ad Valorum component and these vary for each rating category i.e. residential, farmland etc. Ad Valorum is Latin for "according to value". The Base Rate, which is not affected by changes in land value, is set to ensure that every property contributes towards the cost of providing common services regardless of its valuation.

In each rating category the Base Rate is multiplied by the number of properties and subtracted from the total amount of rates to be collected. For example, last year the Base Rate in the farmland category was \$532 per property and the total of Base Rates was almost \$500,000 from about 940 properties.

In order to determine the Ad Valorum component, this total is subtracted from the total rate yield for farmland category, which was \$3.3 million, so the Ad Valorum component was \$2.8 million. Then the valuations for all properties in that category are added together and divided into the Ad Valorum component, to produce a cents-inthe-dollar value, which for farmland was 0.00445 in 2022-23.

In order to determine the rates payable for any particular property, the Valuer-General's valuation of that property is multiplied by the cents-in-the-dollar value and then the Base Rate is added along with other charges such as waste services etc.

#### Village Green Improvements.

The new accessible amenities block at the Village Green is now operational and will be open 24/7. It was funded with Council funds and a grant from the NSW Government. Also, solar powered lighting has been installed around the pathways in the Green at a cost of \$10,000 each.

New accessible play equipment is being installed. The Clarence Town & District Progress Association initiated this project and using their own funds received a 50:50 grant under NSW Community Building Partnership Program. In order to complete the project, provide a shade cover for the new playground, extra solar lighting and concrete pathways, Council allocated \$80,000 from developer contributions (the old Section 94, now called Section 7-11).

All of these projects have been made possible because they were included in the Village Green Concept Plan developed by the Progress Association, Council and the community.



Close doors behind you as you are leaving the house, this will slow the spread of fire between rooms.


