





From the Parson's Pen

The Christian Church has routinely in years gone by been regularly consulted on all manner of social and ethical questions that society raises. Generations that have come and gone have all have had their contentious issues that the Church has attempted to speak into and, give where possible a response that (if done wisely) seeks to enrich our lives. Invariably this requires those church representatives who speak into the public square on matters of practically any subject, need to explore the big questions of our generation through the lens of that which is known to us as the very Word of God. This will require an element of thoughtfulness as we look at each problem or contentious issue by analysing what the Word of God tells us in a Creation, Fall, Redemption, New Creation paradigm. What does Scripture have to say about issue X when we consider all that we know about God's Creation? What does the fall of humanity mean for issue X and its impacts, what does the redemption we find played out by the coming of Christ say in response to an issue like X, and what will the coming of the new creation mean for issue X? Of course, this method relies on a number of assumptions, namely that we are not merely evolved accidental pond scum, that God exists, he created all things, he has spoken through his prophets, and most recently via his Son, the Lord Jesus Christ as recorded in the Old and New Testaments. But then this is the 'Parson's Pen' after all. The method above can be an incredibly useful and powerful tool when speaking into life's complexities. Especially in our own eneration, where uniformity of opinion seems to be a more significant endeavour for certain activists than freedom of speech ever was. This sad development has at its core a reluctance to be corrected over anything. A reluctance to listen carefully to another point of view or allowing one's own preconceived ideas to be freely challenged with intelligent discussion. It seems in many quarters, as a society we have lost (or at least are losing) the art of disagreeing well, a principle that has historically separated civilised society and barbarians. The sad fact is that a society that encourages and majors in merely uniformity of opinion, does so at the peril of truth. Truth no longer has traction in a society where uniformity of opinion reigns supreme, and as a result things like justice, freedom of expression and freedom of speech - die. Author and critic of soviet era Communism, Alexander Solzhenitsyn knew well the effects of uniformity of opinion when taken to its logical conclusion. His book the Gulag Archipelago is chilling in its description of what can happen when freedom and truth is replaced with State enforced uniformity of opinion. Why do I mention these things? Because it was the Lord Jesus himself who claimed to be the truth. "I am the way, the truth and the life" Jesus said. In John 8:31-32 he also said, "If you hold to my teaching, you really are my disciples. Then you will know the truth, and the truth will set you free." Our society needs to hear these words of our Saviour as much now as in anytime of the past. Courage to be obedient to God's Word is what it takes, and a resolve the withstand the negative press, loss of privileges or outright persecution that comes our way when we do. Christianity is still changing peoples' lives, and many are being saved for an eternity of paradise by the grace of God. But all that comes at a cost, as indeed it should. After all, our Lord stayed faithful and obedient to the Father, obedient to the point of death, even death on a cross. Each time we are criticised or maligned for our opinion based on our Christian faith, in some way we participate in the sufferings of Christ. And while that hurts, we are called to stand firm, knowing it is for the sake of the truth. The Truth that is personified in the life, death, and resurrection of our Lord Jesus Christ. 

Council Report

Brig O Johnston Bridge



In 2021, grant funding for Council to build a replacement bridge was approved by the Federal and NSW Governments, and by December 2022 the design was finalised and approved by Heritage NSW. However, an additional \$4.86 million was required to construct this design.

While the extra funding was being sought, the Federal Government imposed a freeze on all its infrastructure spending with every project under review including their commitment of \$8.8 million. No decision is expected until late September at the earliest.

Draft Dungog Waste Management Strategy and Action Plan 2023-2043

Council's Draft Dungog Waste Management Strategy and Action Plan 2023-2043 was placed on public exhibition last month and it's displayed on Council's website. Over the next two decades, Dungog Shire's population, and consequently its waste output, is projected to surge by over 45%. But despite this potential increase, even a continuation of the present quantum of waste is a major concern that cannot be ignored.

Sadly, local communities are forced to pay for disposing the multitude of packaging materials at the wrong end of the waste stream instead of placing this burden where the packaging is produced in the first place. There are several issues under consideration in the Draft Strategy:

Firstly, there is commendable Commonwealth and State legislation intended to reduce the amount of waste and the most important target is to have a resource recovery rate of 80% by 2030. There will be mandates for increased use of recycled materials in packaging etc. and plastics that cannot be recycled are supposed to be banned by 2025. Council is charged \$94 for every tonne of waste delivered to the landfill and this increases with the CPI.

Secondly, extending the expected life of the landfill is a major consideration of the Strategy because remediating the site will be expensive as will be options for its replacement. The waste strategy considers several scenarios predicting the expected life of the landfill and in particular options for extending it.

One option under consideration is the introduction of a kerbside collection service with a third bin for food and garden waste (FOGO). This offers the potential to reduce waste to landfill by up to 50% and the material would be converted to compost. A FOGO service could be introduced when the current waste collection contract is renewed in 2025.

Waste charges are determined on a user pays system aiming to be revenue neutral, but Council will also have to begin collecting funds in order to close the landfill when it has reached maximum capacity limits (at least \$10 million). Whatever options are selected, our annual waste charges will need to increase.

Rural Fire Service 10 STEPS TO BECOMING A VOLUNTEER JOINING A RURAL FIRE BRIGADE



YOU SHOULD BE PREPARING YOUR HOME FOR THE FIRE SEASON NOW.

Wait until the fire is on top of you and you may die.

In case of big fires there will not be enough trucks and Fire Fighters to protect everyone so you need to learn how to look after yourself for a period of time until help arrives.

Look at your local town....How many properties? What is the population? How many <u>ACTIVE</u> Fire fighters – *mid week, maybe 4 or 5 if you're lucky*? How many trucks – *maybe 1 or 2*?

What are the chances of a Big Red Fire Truck turning up at your place when the big one hits...Very slim!

Remember that all Fire Fighters in the RFS are Volunteers and may be out of town at work during the week when the big one hits so the odds drop dramatically of help arriving quickly if everyone is under threat so please prepare yourself and your property. It is your responsibility to prepare your property by removing as much fuel as possible. Fuel is anything that will burn e.g. piles leaves, branches etc.

Here are a few things you need to start now. PREPARE.

You must make important decisions before the fire season starts.

You are at risk from bush fires if you live or work near bushland, grassland, scrub, or farmland.

A fire can be terrifying, with strong winds, intense heat and flames, and thick smoke.

Don't make rushed and dangerous decisions.

Prepare your Bush Fire Survival Plan.

Relocate aged, young and sick family members early from areas likely to be impacted by fires.

Leaving early is the safest option. Where will you go? Your **well-prepared home** will increase the safety of fire fighters and is more likely to survive a bush fire even if you leave early.

Make sure you have an Asset Protection Zone which is a cleared area around your structures, this will help protect your home and give the Fire Fighters a safer place to fight the fire from.

Get rid of leaves and branches, move wood piles away from the house or any other structure, prepare your emergency kits and tools you will need to fight a fire. In case of fire will you leave or will you stay and defend, if staying, who will stay, where will you go if you are leaving early, lots of decisions to make to keep your family safe.

Protect your family. Protect your life.

CLARENCE TOWN FIRST RESPONDERS (CFR)

The Australian Road Rescue Organisation (ARRO) is the peak body in Australasia for the development and exchange of information, knowledge and skills in road and trauma rescue. Every year ARRO conducts a challenge and invites teams from across Australasia from all emergency services agencies to participate in a variety of road rescue and trauma related challenges. Why am I telling you this?

Earlier this year the NSW RFS was invited to participate in the ARRO challenge for the first time. The RFS was invited to compete in the Trauma and CPR challenge events. The ARRO challenge this year was held in Adelaide. The RFS identified the Clarence Town CFR group, due to its high level of activity and success within the community, to enter into the challenge.

Our CFR group put out expressions of interest amongst its members and four members put their hand up and were selected (2 teams of 2) to enter the challenge. Emma Hallahan and Shaun Cox were one team and Wendy Trevethan and myself were the second team. Our Captain, Alex Weston was our team manager and organiser. The teams trained for the event, honing their skills around a whole variety of trauma related incidents.

Given this was our first year competing in the ARRO Challenge, we wanted to do our best but ultimately learn from and enjoy the experience and hopefully be invited back again.

Between June 28 and July 2, we were in Adelaide at the event. The first day was a symposium where we were provided with some major incident and disaster case studies from around the world and taught some current recognised trauma response techniques. The next three days was when we competed. Whilst we were at the event only for the Trauma and CPR challenge, the opportunity to watch and learn from the Road Rescue exhibits and challenges was truly worthwhile as well. Plus, we were supporting our friends from Port Stephens SES.

Our teams had to compete in two separate trauma challenges and the CPR challenge. The trauma scenarios were very real to life. The preparation that went into setting up the trauma incident and scene was terrific and presented our teams with very real to life situations. The types of traumas included impalements, amputated limbs, serious head injuries, major burns to large parts of the body, life threatening haemorrhages, quad bike accidents, circular saw accidents and combinations of all the above.

Going in a bit green and having to rely on response kits that were foreign to the team was a bit of a challenge in itself. The teams had no idea going into each challenge what they would be faced with. It wasn't until the team was escorted into the challenge pit that they first identified the trauma they were faced with managing. The teams had 15 minutes in total to manage and treat the casualty which included a thorough handover to the assessors at the end as we would normally do on the arrival of paramedics to the scene.

Emma and Shaun were faced with an amputated left leg above the knee with massive blood loss and a head injury for their first trauma and the second one was an impalement which was a steel rod through the upper thigh. Wendy and I were faced with a fireworks explosion incident which caused full thickness burns to the whole front of the persons body and the second scenario was a life threatening spurting arterial bleed to the thigh and a hand stuck in a circular saw.

Both teams worked really well together, were able to switch on to the incident they were faced with and provide the appropriate treatment really well. Both teams received very good feedback from the assessors with scores in the High to Thorough level. Out of the 29 teams competing in the Trauma challenge event our two teams ranked 13 and 16 respectively. The organisers of the event were very satisfied with our teams' efforts and level of competence, which prompted an extended invitation for NSW RFS to future challenge events. The RFS has decided that Clarence Town RFS will provide the entry teams for next years event. Well done Clarence Town CFR group. By the way, we also did really well in the CPR challenge.

The team came away from the event feeling very proud of the way they had performed and the result achieved as well as being able to represent the NSW RFS to a high standard. The team has come back with some great insights and learnings into responding to trauma incidents which has been passed onto the rest of the Clarence Town CFR group and will help the CFR group to provide a high level of service to our community.



We send our condolences to his family and friends.






News from Glen William Public School
